

Diane T. Adamczyk, O.D., F.A.A.O. is Director of Residency Education and an Associate Professor at SUNY Optometry where she was formerly the Chief of the Primary Care Optometry Service. Dr. Adamczyk is a co-author of the textbook *Primary Eyecare in Systemic Disease*. She is a private practice consultant and a national and international lecturer on topics in primary care, ocular disease, and ocular pharmacology.

Jill Autry, O.D., R.Ph. received her pharmacy degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She practiced as a critical care pharmacist before returning for her optometry degree at the University of Houston. Following graduation, she completed a residency in ocular disease and surgical co-management at the Eye Center of Texas referral center where she is a partner today. Dr. Autry is an adjunct professor at the University of Houston College of Optometry and is the program director for both residents and student interns at the Eye Center of Texas. She lectures nationally and internationally on a variety of pharmaceutical and ocular disease topics and has authored numerous articles for both optometric and pharmaceutical journals.

Anthony A. Cavallerano, O.D., F.A.A.O. is the Director of the VHA Care Coordination Services Store and Forward Boston Training Center and is an attending optometrist at VA Boston Health Care System.
